SunSmart Policy 2025

Rationale:

Too much of the sun's UV can cause sunburn, skin and eye damage and skin cancer. UV damage accumulated during childhood and adolescence is associated with an increased risk of skin cancer in later life. Australia has one of the highest rates of skin cancer in the world, with two in three Australians developing some form of skin cancer before age 70.

Aims:

This SunSmart policy provides guidelines to:

- ensure all students and staff are protected from over-exposure to UV radiation;
- ensure the outdoor environment provides shade for students and staff;
- ensure students are encouraged and supported to develop independent sun protection skills to help them
 be responsible for their own sun protection;
- support our school's strategies to meet its duty of care and occupational health and safety obligations to minimise harmful UV exposure for students, staff and visitors.

Implementation:

- To assist with the implementation of this policy, staff and students are encouraged to access the daily local sun protection times via the free SunSmart app, or at sunsmart.com.au or myuv.com.au.
- The sun protection measures listed are used for all outdoor activities during the **daily local sun protection times** (whenever UV levels are 3 or higher), typically from mid-August to the end of April in Victoria.

Healthy physical environment

Seek shade

- The School Council will endeavour to make sure there are sufficient shelters and trees providing shade in outdoor areas particularly in high-use areas e.g. where students have lunch, canteen, assemblies, sports, outdoor lessons and popular play spaces. Shade sails have been installed over the three sand pits.
- The availability of shade is considered when planning all other outdoor activities.
- Students are encouraged to use available areas of shade when outside.
- Students who do not have appropriate hats or outdoor clothing are asked to play in the shade in the undercover areas.
- In consultation with School Council, shade provision is considered in plans for future buildings and grounds.
- A shade assessment is conducted regularly to determine the current availability and quality of shade.

Healthy social environment

Slip on sun protective clothing

Sun protective clothing is included in our school uniform / dress code and sports uniform. School clothing is cool, loose-fitting and made of densely woven fabric. It includes shirts with collars.

Slap on a hat

- All students are required to wear a school broad-brimmed hat that protects their face, neck and ears
 whenever they are outside. In Term 1 and Term 4 the school has a "no hat no play" policy. In Terms 2 and
 Term 3 students will be asked to wear their hat when the UV levels are 3 or higher.
- Peak caps and visors are not considered a suitable alternative.

Slop on sunscreen

- Students must provide their own SPF30 (or higher) broad-spectrum, water-resistant sunscreen.
- Students can apply their own sunscreen at least 20 minutes (where possible) before going outdoors and reapply every two hours or more frequently if sweating or swimming.
- Strategies are in place to remind students to apply sunscreen before going outdoors (e.g. reminder notices, sunscreen monitors, sunscreen buddies).

Slide on sunglasses

• Where practical, students are encouraged to wear close-fitting, wrap-around sunglasses that meet the Australian Standard 1067 (Sunglasses: Category 2, 3 or 4) and cover as much of the eye area as possible.

Engaging children, educators, staff and families

- SunSmart behaviour is regularly reinforced and promoted to the whole school community through newsletters, school website/intranet, staff and parent meetings, school assemblies, student and teacher activities and at student enrolment/new staff orientation.
- As part of OHS UV risk controls and role-modelling, staff, families and visitors:
 - o wear a sun protective hat, covering clothing and, if practical, sunglasses;
 - o apply sunscreen; and
 - o seek shade whenever possible.
